


We buried two former Gibault teachers this week, as Jerry Bolen and Fr. Gary Gumersheimer went home to God. Jerry was efficatious. He could get not only the music out of his students, but he turned many of them into life-long musicians who are still playing professionally. Jerry helped jumpstart the ICS Band as a feeder into Gibault, as well. I just mentioned his name at our Christmas concert during my introduction of Mr. Ruppel this year. In the 1970's at a concert, Jerry announced the next song would be from a piece by Beethoven. My oldest daughter yelled out "YEAYYY!" blushed and said, "Well, there's at least one Beethoven fan here" and the crowd roared. Fr. Gary lived life loud, and Fr. Bob Flannery paid him a great tribute yesterday. Obituaries never tell the full story. Fr. Gary's commitment to Boys' Nation nationally and in the States of Illinois and California, his work in International Marriage Encounter, and having taught at all three Catholic High Schools in the Diocese missed his obit. Add to that the fact that his hospital and nursing home visitors often requested the Sacrament of Reconciliation from him and you can understand "the rest of the story." Bishop McGovern said it so well when he said Fr. Gary's wheelchair and hospital bed became his Altar. He continued ministering to the end. At his death, he woke to recite the prayers of the Anointing of the Sick and the Our Father with Fr. Flannery. As we meet our God, our Faith and rituals stick. God bless and keep Jerry and Fr. Gary in the palm of his Hand.

THE #1 SCIENCE BREAKTHROUGH OF THE YEAR 2022 --- NUCLEAR-FUSION --- will be featured on 60 Minutes this Sunday, January 15. Dr. Mark Herrmann, PhD, of Immaculate Conception School, Gibault Catholic High School, Washington University, and Princeton University educational background, has been a driving force in this effort. Dr. Herrmann, in his true humble style, hand-picked young scientists for the interview for 60 Minutes in the hopes of encouraging future passion for the decade or two it will take to bring nuclear fusion to solving the world energy problems. It took 70 years, but physicists at the National Ignition Facility (NIF) at Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory finally had more output than energy input. Although commercial production of fusion energy is still a pipe dream, researchers at NIF in California have done what a similar project in France has yet to do. The hope for the future is more energy gains from nuclear fusion, which can provide an infinite source of clean energy that's carbon-free and doesn't emit radioactive waste. They have proven that a dream is possible. We are proud of our connection to Dr. Mark Herrmann and his part in making a better future for the world. Mark's parents are Joan and Tom Herrmann of Immaculate Conception Parish in Columbia, IL and brother Matt and sister-in-law Cyra are grads along with nephews and nieces Thomas, Lucas, Reagan, and Avery in the Class of 2026.

And here are the other Top Five...

2 WE ALSO MADE BETTER BATTERIES At the <u>University of Sydney</u>, scientists engineered a sodium-sulfur battery that can be made using seawater, storing four times the energy as lithium-ion batteries and costing much less. Over at <u>Penn State</u>, engineers figured out a way to charge electric vehicle batteries in 10 minutes, which could help in the broader adoption of gasoline-free cars.

- **3 AND SIMULATED A WORMHOLE** Google's quantum computer, Sycamore 2, was used to replicate a <u>wormhole</u> and transfer information through it. Modeled after the Holographic Principle, the experiment was used to imitate the hypothesis that connected black holes lead to wormholes, which are tunnels through space and time.
- **4 OUR UNIVERSE CAME INTO FOCUS** About a year ago, NASA launched the James Webb Space Telescope. A million miles away from the Earth's surface, it not only gives us clearer pictures of our galaxy but also allows scientists all over the world to study deep space like never before
- **5 AND MAYBE GOT A LITTLE SAFER** In more galactic news, the space race has turned into space wars—sort of. In September, <u>NASA's Double Asteroid Redirection Test (DART)</u> successfully struck the largest asteroid to date, Dimorphos, and altered its orbit around its parent asteroid, Didymos, by 32 minutes. NASA is conducting experiments using DART to prepare for potential asteroids headed toward Earth.
