





Mrs. Pam Kueker is doing a great job connecting with our students. The same goes for counseling which is one of the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit. We all need it. There is no weakness in seeking help for our bodies so why should there be for our spirits?

WANT TO BE A BETTER STUDENT/PARENT? LIMIT SOCIAL MEDIA. Don't cancel it. There are so many positive experiences, if done in a Christian way. Yet it can jack with social, emotional, and cognitive skills that are still developing in many of us. Social development is impaired by lessening meaningful relationships, isolation and loneliness, disrupted sleep from staying up playing games far into the night, decreased focus, inappropriate and dangerous content, and cyber bullying which is the bane of many. It is here to stay. Will it won us or will we own it? Healthy boundaries are the wise decision. According to a research study performed this year by Yale Medicine, teens age 12-15 who spend more than 3 hours a day on social media are facing twice the risk of having negative mental health outcomes, including symptoms of depression and anxiety. Setting ground rules and keeping the conversation going is essential say Yale experts.


